CelticFest Mississippi 2009, the Celtic Heritage Society's 19th annual weekend festival is almost here! Take your mind _______ off of the weather at air-conditioned

CelticFest is a celebration of the Celtic nations including Ireland, Scotland, Wales, Cornwall, the Isle of Man and Brittany. It takes place on September 10-

13 at the Mississippi Agricultural and Forestry Museum. *CelticFest* features an exceptional variety of exciting Irish and Scottish music and dance on 6 stages, plus free Celtic




heritage, music and dance workshops, a children's area, Celtic specialty vendors, and plenty of food and drink. Because much of the festival takes place indoors, CelticFest will be held RAIN OR SHINE!

CelticFest annually features several headlining artists of both international status and high caliber. 2009's artists are Irish supergroup **TRIAN** (featuring Liz Carroll-fiddle, Billy McComiskey-button accordion, and Daithi Sproule-guitar), Dublin balladeer **BRENDAN NOLAN**, the newly formed

1st Annual Filum Festival

Thursday evening *CelticFest* is teaming up with the Crossroads Film Society to present CelticFest's first ever night of Irish film. The evening will begin with a selection of short films (TBA), followed by a discussion of the award winning feature film, <u>The Wind that Shakes the Barley</u>. Máirtín de Cógáin, who plays "Sean" in the film will be the master of ceremonies for the event. Tickets are \$7 General Admission or \$5 for Crossroads / CHS / Jackson Irish Dancers members and the event will be held in the Main Auditorium of the Heritage Exhibit Center.

The festival will continue on Friday night 7pm-12am with music/dance performances on multiple stages, vendors, the Whiskey and Scotch Tasting benefit, and an open tune session.

11th Annual Irish Whiskey and Scotch Tasting

The 11th Annual Tasting will begin at 7:30pm Friday night and will mark the first Tasting held in **Sparkman Auditorium**. The Irish Whiskey and Scotch Tasting is led once again by the esteemed Master Distiller, Evan Cattanach, from Kingussie, Scotland. Mr. Cattanach is the Ambassador of the Classic Malt collection with 47 years of personal experience years in the Scottish distilling industry. This event is sponsored by Wine & Spirits in the Quarter and

Mr. Cattanach will also be at Wine and Spirit in the Quarter on Friday the 11th from 4-5 pm prior to the Whisky tasting to sign bottles.

On Saturday, the gates open at 10 am with even more entertainment, workshops, and activities continuously until midnight. The gates open again 11 am Sunday for another day of Celtic fun.

The South's Largest Céilí

An ever popular highlight of CelticFest, the massive Céilí Dance (pronounced 'kay-lee') caps off the Saturday night. No



dancing experience is required to participate – beginners are welcome. The Céilí will be led again this year by **Eamon de Cógáin** from Cork, Ireland.

The children won't be left out— *CelticFest* is a family-friendly festival! There will be a Children's Area and kid-oriented

vendors on the grounds.

Admission is \$12 for an adult Weekend Pass, \$8 for seniors and students, \$5 for children ages 5-17, and \$1 for children under four. "A greater value of this quality can't be had in Jackson....," says Harvey Kimble, past president of the Celtic Heritage Society.

serves as a registration fee, and after that you pay just \$10 per class. It's cheaper than the gym, it's lively, educational, aerobic, and it's the only place in Mississippi where you can find traditional Irish dance classes with a Dublin-certified instructor. Come on out and give it a try!

We also arrange for top-notch singing workshops, in English and Celtic languages. All workshops are held by *CelticFest's* headlining and regional performers. It's a great way to get some musical instruction from great musicians in an intimate setting!
